Questions Answers

Q:1 Why couldn't the Girl describe the killer?

Ans: The Girl could not describe the killer because she had not seen him clearly. She was too frightened and confused to remember him. Therefore, the Girl couldn't describe his appearance.

Q:2 What were the circumstances that forced the girl to leave the car?

(or) Why was the girl forced to leave the car on the road?

Ans: The Girl was coming from a party and her car ran out of gas. It was a dark stormy night. There were almost no cars on the road so she locked her car and started walking on the road. She thought she could get the bus when it came along. So, these circumstances forced the girl to leave her car.

Q:3 Why did the Girl ask for the help from the First Man?

(or) Why did the Girl consider the First Man her helper?

Ans: When the Girl reached the bus station and came across the First Man, she instantly sought his help. It never occurred to her that the murderer could reach there before her. Moreover, the First Man, established his trust by being kind and supportive.

Q:4 What was the condition of the weather?

Ans: The weather was stormy. It was raining heavily and continuously. There were lightning flashes followed by large bursts of thunder.

Q:5 How did the Second Man accuse the First Man of lying?

Ans: The Second Man had already seen the Girl through the glass of the door, but he found the First Man hesitant to tell him about the Girl. Therefore, the Second Man accused him of lying.

Q:1 How does Kreton prove his extraordinary powers?

Ans: Kreton, the alien, has extraordinary powers which he proves through his actions. He can hear the minds. He can sense what is going to happen in future too. When the troops try to take his ship apart, through his unusual and remarkable power, he erects an invisible wall around it. Besides, he also knows all Earthian languages. When General Powers and Aide rush to seize him, he forces to hold them back within a foot of him.

Q:2 What is the purpose of the visit of Kreton?

Ans: Kreton has been studying the planet Earth and human civilization for innumerable years. The purpose of his visit is to see human civilization and development more closely. With his extraordinary Powers, he wants to take charge of the planet Earth. He calls the Earth people his hobby.

Q:3 How much advanced is the civilization of Kreton than that of the Earth?

Q:1 What is Harry's philosophy of life?

Ans: Harry's philosophy of life is *"Take-it-easy way."*

Q:2 What type of play 'The Oyster and the Pearl' is?

Ans: The play 'The Oyster and the Pearl' is a sentimental comedy that is based on tender feelings rather than reasonable and practical judgements. It has plenty of humor, wit and also fulfils moralistic purposes. It has a happy ending and demonstrates faith in the basic goodness of human nature.

Q:3 Where does the play take place?

(or) How does the barber shop serve as the stage?

Ans: The play takes place in the barber shop of Harry Van Dusen in O.K-by-the-Sea in California.

The shop serves as a stage for the play.

Q:4 Why is Harry sitting in the barber's chair?

Ans: Harry is seated in the chair, when the play begins. A boy of nine or ten named Clay Larrabee is giving him a haircut.

Q:5 What is Harry doing when the play begins?

Ans: When the play begins, Clay Larrabee is giving Harry a haircut. While getting the haircut, Harry is reading a book.

Q:6 According to Harry, how does one bring merriment to the tired human heart?

Ans: According to Harry, a person may bring merriment to the tired old human heart by composing a symphony, painting a picture, writing a book or inventing a philosophy.

Q:7 What is Miss McCutcheon looking for? How does she feel about the children of the town?

Ans: Miss McCutcheon is looking for a chance to teach, but she is greatly disappointed after meeting the children of the town. She feels that the children are not serious about their studies. She finds them unruly and irresponsible. They only seem to be interested in games and the sea.

Q:8 Did Miss McCutcheon believe that there was a pearl in the oyster?

Ans: Miss McCutcheon was a realist. She insisted that only one oyster in a million had a pearl in it. She believed that everyone should face the truth and truth was that there was no pearl in the oyster.

Q:9 What kind of judge was Applegarth?

Q:10 How does Harry describe the inhabitants of O.K-by-the-Sea?

Ans: Clay was a poor boy of nine years who never enjoyed life as children should. Thus, many people may believe that he should be remained under the illusion that there was a pearl in the

oyster as it would bring mental peace and comfort to him. Such an attitude may cause more harm than good in the long

Q:12 What year it is?

Ans: The year is 1953.

Q:13 In your opinion, does the play reveal the author's view of life? If so, what is his view of life?

Ans: In the play, "The Oyster and the Pearl", William Saroyan appears to be a sensitive person who wants everyone to lead a carefree life. He understands the problems of the poor and is of the view that service of suffering humanity brings spiritual happiness and peace of mind. Besides, Harry's philosophy "Take-it-easy" also has its roots in the writer's viewpoint of life.

Q:14 Who is Miss McCutcheon? How does she feel about her job?

Ans: Miss McCutcheon is a new teacher at school who has come from San Francisco. She feels overwhelmed and defeated. She wants to quit and go back to home.

Q:15 How much did Harry pay for his shop?

Ans: Harry paid seventy -five dollars for his barber shop.

Q:16 How long has he been in O.K-by-the-Sea?

Ans: Harry has been in O.K-by-the-Sea for twenty-four years.

Q:17 What has attracted Harry and other people to O.K-by-the-Sea? Do you think that it resembles an ideal town?

Ans: The simplicity, innocence and contentment of the people of the O.K by-the-Sea attracted Harry and the other people. The inhabitants of the town showed that they were satisfied with their lives. They were poor. Many of them could not even pay for a haircut. Mostly, they grew vegetables

to sell but they were loving and caring. They were the people who were poor materially but they were rich spiritually. They never complaint about their poverty. They lived simple and honest lives.

Q:18 In your opinion, why is the writer willing to buy the pearl? What has he received in return? What does he mean by saying: “As far as I am concerned, the whole thing’s a pearl?”

Ans: The writer is the good-natured person. He has a kind and sympathetic heart. He happened to listen to the harsh realities of Larrabee family at Harry’s shop and realized the intensity of Clay’s dream. Thus, in order to help him and to keep his dream intact, he decides to buy the oyster. To him, it doesn’t matter whether there is actually a pearl in it or not. He is mainly concerned with the inner satisfaction and contentment that his selfless deeds will bring.

Q:19 How many barbers are there in O.K-by-the-Sea?

Ans: O.K-by-the-Sea is a town with small population of 909. Harry is the only barber in the town.

Q:20 How much does Harry charge for haircuts?

Ans: Harry generally charges one dollar for a haircut. But he often charges half or a quarter dollar. In some cases, he gives people haircut even free of cost.

Q:21 Where was Clay going when the play opened up?

Ans: Clay was going to the sea from the barber shop to find something “real good” when the play opened up.

Q:22 Why does the writer not open the oyster?

Ans: The writer does not open the oyster as he claims that he wants the whole thing and he believes that the pearl hasn’t stopped growing yet.

Q:23 Why does Clark return?

Ans: Clark Larrabee reads the advertisement in “The Gull”, in which his family has requested Clark to come back. After reading this ad in “The Gull” Clark returns.

Q:24 What does the writer do with the oyster?

Ans: The writer buys the oyster from Clay for three hundred dollars to help his family. He puts the oyster in his coat pocket and goes out.

Q:25 Why does Clay need money? (important)

Ans: Clay needs money to bring his father back home. He also wants to buy a present for his mother.

Q:26 What had happened to Clay's father? (important)

Ans: Clay's father, Clark Larrabee, had a quarrel with his wife over money. He left his home a month ago in anger. Then he started working at Salinas.

Q:27 What does Clay want to put up (place) in the local paper?

Ans: Clay wants to put up (place) an advertisement in a local newspaper to call his father, Clark Larrabee, back home.

Q:28 What does Harry advise Miss McCutcheon to do? (important)

Ans: Harry advises Miss McCutcheon to go back to San Francisco while the going's good. He feels the town is too dull and drab for her youth and intelligence.

Q:29 What kind of haircut does Miss McCutcheon want?

Ans: Miss McCutcheon wants to have a poodle haircut from Harry.

Q:30 Why does Miss McCutcheon want a poodle haircut?

Or

What does Miss McCutcheon think that a poodle haircut will do for her appearance?

Ans: She wants to fit in the society of the town and feel easy.

Q:31 Can Harry give a poodle haircut?

Ans: No, Harry cannot give a poodle haircut as he has never seen a poodle dog.

Q:32 Where has Clark Larrabee been? How does he get to O.K.-by-the-sea?

Ans: Clark Larabee has been working in Salinas since he left his family. He gets a ride down in a truck and made a stop- over at O.K-by-the-Sea while passing through that region.

Q:33 What does Clark give Harry? For what purpose?

Ans: Clark gives thirty dollars to Harry so that he could give it to Clay who will give it to his mother.

Q:34 How far is it to Hollywood from O.K.-by-the-sea?

Ans: Hollywood is about two hundred miles straight down the highway from O.K.-by-the-Sea.
